NEWSLETTER – August 2006

1. Maputo conference

Thanks to Richard, Victor, Piet, Johan, Nico, Wynand, Gordon and their assistants for a most enjoyable conference at the Pestana Rovuma Hotel in June. The venue was very comfortable and the food excellent. The variety of pastries and cakes on offer was staggering, and that was only breakfast! The programme was interesting and varied with a high proportion of students, who gave excellent presentations. Thanks to the Water Research Commission who made funds available for student support.

The conference was combined with the Phycological Society and this worked well with a lot of common ground between the two societies. A generous sponsorship of Laurentina Beer ensured that many discussions carried on well into the night. Most managed to squeeze onto the RAU bus to visit the Ncomati estuary at Macaneta followed by an obligatory seafood dinner at the legendary Costa da Sol.

2. SASAqS AGM report back

The AGM, held during the Maputo conference, was a reasonably quiet affair with the Journal and our publishing agreement with NISC generating most of the discussion. Michelle Weyl, representing NISC, was able to clarify many of the issues and concerns raised especially those relating to ISI rating, quality of figures and page charges. SASAqS already subsidises page charges for the 'rest of Africa' and NISC is willing to do the same. Paid up Society members also receive a discount on page charges. Details relating to the Journal and NISC taking over the billing for the Society will be given in a later newsletter.

The honorarium given to Mike Coke as Honorary Editor of the Journal was substantially increased to R12,000 pa in recognition of the huge effort he devotes to the task, not least of which is finding and cajoling referees.

Conferences in the next few years were discussed. With no firm offers received, suggestions were to pursue the possibility of a combining with Zoosoc in Potchefstroom in 2007, persuade the Pietermaritzburg members to look at the Drakensberg for 2008 and to investigate a Botswana or Angola venue for 2009. We are also following up on the SIL conference in 2010.

3. Membership and fees

Hendrik has prepared the accounts for 2006 and they are being posted out. Many, mainly new, members paid the old fee of R175 and they have been billed for the difference between this and the new fees accepted in the postal ballot. Note that only members who were paid up at the end of 2004 will receive accounts. We have many DORMANT members. These members have fees that are more than TWO years outstanding (This includes 2005 and 2006: i.e. those who were last paid up for 2004 or before). Such members WILL NOT receive an account and are effectively no longer members of the Society. I will be sending a separate posting in the next week to these members to (a) let them know who they are and (b) to invite them to contact the Treasurer if they want to reinstate their membership. Only members who are paid up for 2005 will be authorised for online access of the Journal in 2006. Members who still owe for 2005 will be billed but will not receive Journal access.
